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State of Our Chapter



The Sonoma County North Team

In March of 2020, we thought we would be postponing a few events for a few months. One of our Board members predicted we'd have to cancel everything until the end of the year. What! Are you crazy?! Well, no.

We became more familiar with Zoom than we expected, and our monthly Board meetings gave us the chance to see and update each other as well as consider changes to the Board structure and policies.

We ended 2020 with a Zoomed Annual Meeting on Terra Madre Day, December 10, during which we reported on the state of our chapter and shared some of our family food traditions.

Voting on Board and Bylaws

At the meeting, the 30 attending members voted in new Board member Kate Hendricks, and returning Board member Debbi Crapeau. Members also approved changes to chapter bylaws to delete term limits for Board members and increase the number of members beyond 7.

Other Chapter Business

Financial. Treasurer Mark Crapeau reported that the chapter has \$4,342 in the General Fund. In addition, each project has its own fund with proceeds from individual fund-raising or sales.

Communication. Communication Chair Carol Diaz reported that media activities include a website, our bi-monthly newsletter, emails to members, and Ark of Taste sightings. The chapter has 1245 Facebook followers and 1438 Instagram followers. Articles appeared in *Sonoma Magazine*, *Marin Magazine*, and the *Press Democrat*.

Events. Marie Giacalone, Events Chair, described a 100-mile Dinner and the Snail of Approval Awards Ceremony that were held before the March lockdown. Since March, Slow Books has met every 6 weeks via Zoom to discuss the selected book and share photos of food prepared from the book.

Project Updates

Project leaders reported on the highlights of their teams' activities:

AMIDI (Marilee Wingert): AMIDI is the Association of Indigenous women for Wholistic Development in Guatemala. Through donations this year, each interested member received a pregnant goat to start a small herd for selling both the milk and the offspring. All members also received a spacious rabbit hutch and bunnies; they use the manure for fertilizer and sell the offspring in the local market town. For months, a COVID19 ban of all public transportation resulted in the increased cost of staples. We have provided 3 distributions of staples such as corn, beans, rice, soap, and disinfectant.

Bodega Red Potato Presidium (Barbara Bowman): The Presidium sold 4,500 pounds of seed potatoes to farms and retailers in Sonoma and Marin County. The potatoes made their supermarket debut at Oliver's Market, and Quail & Condor Bakery used Bodega Reds in their bread. Publicity on the history and availability of the potato appeared in the *Press Democrat* and *Sonoma Magazine*.

Local Farmer Project (Lisa Hunter): The project made two overlapping grants to farmers. Little Rocky Ranch completed their grant in September, and Kicking Bull Farms was funded in September. Vanessa Advocate (Little Rocky) and William Henpenn (Kicking Bull) both reported on their progress at the meeting.

Grow Out/School Gardens (Debbi Crapeau): Although the project grew Ark of Taste seedlings for the 8 project schools, the plants could not be distributed when the pandemic closed school campuses. Ark seed packets were, however, sent to farmers who requested them.

Snail of Approval (Kathy Matonak): A celebration of 2019 Snail Awardees was held in February. Because of COVID19, all applications, nominations, and interviews with potential new restaurants, farms, and artisan producers were suspended.


Bodega Red Presidium Update

Due to volatile weather this summer, the Bodega Red seed potato crop for 2021 was much smaller than usual, yielding only 1525 pounds available to Sonoma County growers compared with 4,500 pounds in 2020. We are selling this reduced crop to 18 growers who have bought Bodega Reds from us in the past.

Although nothing is certain when Mother Nature is involved, we expect to have an ample supply of seed for 2022!
